1. The Truckee Tahoe Airport District ("District") has established a recent history, over the past ~8 years, of utilizing tax revenue to support community

2. In 2023, the District updated the underlying Board Policy Instruction (PI311) to better define the use of tax revenue related to the "Purpose of an Airport".

3. In 2023, the District adopted a new strategic plan, which identified the following focus area goals related to the use of tax revenue.

a. 1.D. Give Back: Develop a community investment strategy that aligns directly to airport vision, mission, values, and public purpose.

i. 1.D.1. Define budget allocation of community investments.

ii. 1.D.2. Review existing community investments to *prioritize major* projects that benefit the region and align with airport purpose and mission (see Focus Area 3, Goal A for more details).

4. The District approved a budget for 2024, which included funds for both community sponsorships, agency partnerships, and *\$2M for Wildfire Mitigation.* The Wildfire Mitigation line item was contingent on further research and briefing to the District Board for approval. As part of staff research, we engaged in several community conversations, including a hosted discussion at the Tahoe Truckee Community Foundation (TTCF) with key nonprofit organizations and agencies. The meeting confirmed the growing need to fund regional forest management activities, as well as the potential for leveraging of funds thru coordinated efforts. Since that meeting, TTCF has secured a \$10 million commitment over the next five years, contingent on a








# OLYMPIC VALLEY COMMUNITY BUFFER

The OV-4 Project creates a 150-footdeep, 130-acre, shaded fuel break surrounding the Valley's high value residential areas. The project overlaps with Defensible Space Zone 2, encompasses essential facilities such as the Valley's primary water tank, and compliments other CWPP and USFS Projects.



"The 150-foot fuels reduction project surrounding our homes is critical to our survival. Two friends from South Lake Tahoe explained that a similar perimeter allowed the Fire Department to save their homes during the Caldor Fire. The fire intensity was reduced in the perimeter as it neared the house, allowing firefighters to stop the fire just outside their backyard." - Bob Barnett, Olympic Valley Resident









### River Road Buffer Zones Fuels Reduction Project
